





Rural Firefighting Academy Now Offering Courses Online

ROYERSFORD, Pennsylvania – The Rural Firefighting Academy (RFA) announced the release of a new website, LiveFireTraining.com, and the launch of a new online course on Rural Firefighting

"The Rural Firefighting Operations Online Course provides a unique solution to small com-munity fire department training problems of tight budgets, travel obstacles and member availability, "said Dominic Colletti, chief training officer at RFA. "This new online program provides rural-spe-cific firefighting information intended to help small-community firefighters and fire officers successfully

The online program, accessed from RFA's new website, LiveFireTraining.com, offers the flexi-bility volunteer firefighters need to learn at their own pace at an affordable price. It is particularly useful to indoctrinate fire officers, firefighters and summer and the program and their a summer compared to the price of the summer and t pump operators into problem solving issues commonly found with the delivery of rural firefighting services

The student can work at a pace that best fits him or her, and can take up to six months to com-plete the program. Each student successfully com-pleting the course receives a certificate of completion from RFA. The workbook used for the 17 module online

course is the newly-revised, second-edition of The Rural Firefighting Handbook. Each chapter in The Rural Firefighting Handbook corresponds with an Rural Firefighting Handbook corresponds with an online learning module. Students take the course by reading a chapter in the handbook, reviewing the corresponding online module chalkboard presentation, and then taking the online module test. Each module test is "open book," with a time limit, and is comprised of a combination of multiple choice and "true or false" questions. The LiveFireTraining.com website and Rural Firefighting Operations Online Course are avail-able for immediate use by rural firefighters. Acad-emy staff is available through email or by phone to assist students with questions on the course and subject materials.



ISO To Accredit Dry Fire Hydrants In Virginia

RICHMOND – ISO, a leading source of information about property/casualty insurance risk, has started work in the Commonwealth that, when completed, will result in the accreditation of 1,613 dry hydrants in rural areas throughout the state.

What is a dry hydrant?

Water to fight wildfires or structural fires initially comes from fire department tankers or sidewalk fire hydrants, but additional sources are often needed to sustain operations. Firefighters in rural areas use "dry fire hydrants" to make use of local water sources. The Department of Fire Programs (VDFP) and the Department of Forestry (VDOF) work together to make sure firefighters have access to this community resource.

A dry hydrant is a non-pressurized pipe system permanently installed in existing lakes, ponds and streams that provides a suction supply of water to a fire department tank truck. In rural areas, a lack of water mains and pressurized fire hydrants can sometimes impair a fire department's ability to do its job quickly and efficiently.

The success of a fire department's operation hinges on the distance a truck must travel to fill-up and return to the fire. In many cases, these fill-up points are often long distances from the fire, and the firefighters are unable to maintain an uninterrupted water source at the scene.

The installation of a non-pressurized pipe system into a local water source provides a ready means of supplying water to fire engines.

Who pays for dry hydrants?

Virginia's Dry Fire Hydrant Grant Program is funded by the General Assembly through the Virginia Fire Programs Fund. VDOF administers the annual program's \$100,000 allocation, ensuring 100-percent of it goes into the installation or repair of hydrants. To date, the program has provided 1,613 dry fire hydrants to communities across the Commonwealth. Virginia's first dry fire hydrant was installed at the Atlantic Fire Department in Accomack County in 1988.

"The Dry Fire Hydrant Program has been an untold success story in Virginia for years," said VDFP Executive Director Billy Shelton. "Our partnership with VDOF has made it possible to provide firefighters in rural areas with a better chance to save lives and property by making local water sources more accessible. Now, with the ISO accreditation process underway, homeowners may see future reductions in their insurance rates as a long-term result."

State Forester of Virginia Carl Garrison said, "We've worked in concert with the Department of Fire Programs for 24 years to ensure our rural communities are ready and able to protect Virginians from the ravages of wildfire through the installation of these dry hydrants. The annual funding from the General Assembly means nearly 30 new dry hydrants are added to the inventory each year."

What role does ISO play in the process?

Fire protection is one of the risk categories monitored by ISO. They produce the Fire Suppression Rating Schedule (FSRS), a manual containing criteria they use in reviewing firefighting capabilities of individual communities. The schedule measures the major elements of a community's firesuppression system and develops a numerical grading called a Public Protection Classification (PPC[™]).

The FSRS lists a large number of items (facilities and practices) a community should have to fight fires effectively. The Schedule assigns credit points for each item. Using those credit points and various formulas, ISO calculates a total score on a scale of 0 to 100. To receive certain PPC ratings, a community must meet minimum criteria. After a community meets those criteria, the PPC rating depends on the community's score on the 100-point scale. Forty percent of the overall score is based on the community's water supply. This part of the survey focuses on whether the community has sufficient water supply for fire suppression beyond daily maximum consumption. ISO surveys all components of the water-supply system, including pumps, storage and filtration. They observe fire-flow tests at representative locations in the community to determine the rate of flow the water mains provide. They also review the condition and maintenance of fire hydrants. Last, they count the distribution of fire hydrants no more than 1,000 feet from the representative locations.

"The inclusion of the Commonwealth's 1,613 dry fire hydrants should positively impact this portion of the FSRS to the benefit of our citizens," remarked Shelton.

Memorial Campaign Enters New Phase

Construction of Virginia's long-awaited memorial honoring public safety officers who have died in the line of duty is expected to begin in the spring of 2014, according to Virginia Public Safety Foundation (VPSF), the non-profit organization that has served as memorial administrator for the past four years. "Our benchmarks for success, particularly regarding funding, are being met," said C. Hadden Culp, VPSF President and retired Assistant Chief for the Prince William County Department of Fire and Rescue. "We have advised the Commonwealth that we are preparing for construction of the memorial in 2014."

The memorial, which will be built on Capitol Square in Richmond, will honor 802 public safety officers, including nearly 250 firefighters and rescue personnel.

This summer, in partnership with Virginia Department of Fire Programs (VDFP), VPSF has been seeking financial support for the Memorial Fund from Virginia's paid and volunteer fire and rescue agencies. Todate, nearly 30 have made contributions. "We think it's important that every fire and rescue agency support the Memorial Fund, no matter the size of the contribution," said VDFP Executive Director Billy Shelton, who also serves on the VPSF Board of Directors. Shelton noted that law enforcement agencies have contributed more than ten times the amount to the Memorial Fund as fire and rescue. "I hope every agency will offer the support they're able to give," Shelton said.

VPSF says that plans for the memorial's construction, which will take three to four months, and dedication, will be announced at a later date, but says that preparations for both have been in the works for years. "We've been planning for this for a very long time, often with what felt more like hope than expectation. We're happy to be moving forward with the seriousness of purpose required of us with just a few months left before construction commences," Culp said.

Wert Hayes Named Tappahannock Essex Volunteer Fire Department Chief

TAPPAHANNOCK — The Tappahannock Essex Volunteer Fire Department (TEVFD) has recently tapped John W. (Wert) Hayes to serve the two year term as Fire Chief. A native of Essex County, Hayes grew up and currently lives in Elevon. Hayes is a 1981 graduate of Essex High School. 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
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
